From preface to the Commentary on the Psalms

I have been accustomed to call this book, I think not inappropriately, "An Anatomy of all the Parts of the Soul"; for there is not an emotion of which any one can be conscious that is not represented here in a mirror. Or rather, the Holy Spirit has here drawn to life all the griefs, sorrows, fears, doubts, hopes, cares, perplexities, in short, all the distracting emotions with which the minds of men are wont to be agitated.

In short, as calling upon God is one of the principle means of securing our safety, and as a better more unerring rule for guiding us in this exercise cannot be found elsewhere than in the Psalms, it follows, that in proportion to the proficiency which a man shall have attained in understanding them, will be his knowledge of the more important part of celestial doctrine.

From Commentary on Psalm 3:4

With my voice have I cried unto the Lord. [David] here informs us that he had never been so broken by adversity, or cast down by impious scornings, as to be prevented from addressing his prayers to God. And it was an infallible proof of his faith to exercise it by praying even in the midst of his distresses.

From Commentary on Psalm 4

[David,] therefore, teaches us by his example, that as often as we are weighed down by adversity, or involved in very great distress, we ought to meditate upon the promises of God, in which the hope of salvation is held forth to us, so that defending ourselves by this shield, we may break through all the temptations which assail us.

From Commentary on Psalm 6:2

Heal me, O Jehovah. And this the order which we must observe, that we may know that all the blessings which we ask from God flow from the fountain of his free goodness, and that we are then, and only then, delivered from calamities and chastisements, when he has had mercy upon us.

Additional Teaching on Praying with The Psalms

From Introduction in Psalms in 30 Days: compiled and with an Introduction by Trevor Wax

For generations, Christians have prayed and sung the psalms. It was the prayerbook of Jesus. It is the Old Testament book most often quoted in the New. The songs in this book form the bedrock of both corporate and individual devotion...

Songwriter Michael Card writes: "The psalms are a connection for us. When I am lamenting, I may feel disconnected from God. The psalms express that experience. When I am joyful, the psalms give me language to connect with that joy and remember that it comes from God."

When you pray the psalms, you may not feel all of the emotions or passions of the psalmist when you read. But that's the point. "The richness of the Word of God ought to determine our prayer, not the poverty of our heart," wrote Dietrich Bonhoffer. "It does not depend, therefore, on whether the Psalms express adequately that which we feel in a given moment in our heart. If we pray aright, perhaps its is quite necessary that we pray contrary to our own heart."

Who is speaking? An individual? A congregation? God? An enemy?

If the psalm tells a story of some kind, what is it?

What do you see in the poetry? Which lines repeat or contrast?

What life circumstances are described or implied?

What actions of God are described or implied? What does this imply about what God is like?

In your present or past life, what situation is most similar to what the psalmist is feeling?

Who do you know who faces a situation like that of the psalmist?

What in your church or fellowship reminds you of what is described in the psalm?

Who can you imagine, in another country or another part of society, who might face what the psalmist faces?

Recently when I was praying Psalm 23:1 (The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want), I stopped and wrote about the grammar in my journal:

"The Lord is my shepherd," says the psalm. It is in the present tense. It is not that, "The Lord will be my shepherd" in the future, meaning that right now all I can do is wait for it to be true, and be patient. Nor does the text say, "The Lord was my shepherd," in the past. I do not need to grieve that it is over now, and God is no longer caring for me, looking wistfully back to when God seemed closer or more caring. No, God is my shepherd right now, today in my current circumstances.

That may not seem like a particularly deep insight, but it made a difference to me that day – and it came only because I was studying.
