In the midst of all this discussion, in walked the Carpenter of Nazareth.



### **GOING UP? ZION ELEVATOR UPDATE**

Our elevator is working thanks to service by Thiessen Krupp. However, we have been informed that it is getting much harder to obtain replacement parts for the elevator when repairs are necessary. There may come a time in the not so distant future when the elevator will be beyond repair.

Therefore, a few months ago, members of the property committee and council began exploring options for replacing the elevator. Since our elevator was first installed (1930's), a lot has changed in regulations. Consequently, simply replacing the "mechanics" of our elevator while continuing to use the same elevator car in the same elevator shaft is not an option.

We have considered a chair lift from the ground floor to the second floor where our worship space is located. However, there are some difficulties in finding an appropriate location. Additionally, while this option may be cheaper in the short-term, the average life span of a chair lift can be as short as 7 or 8 years.

We have met with the JEM group (contractor) and Ritchie Engineering regarding the installation of a new elevator. A representative from JEM will be attending the May council meeting to present the proposal. Listed below are meetings times which will be open to the congregation to receive information about replacing the elevator. There will be opportunities to ask questions at these meetings.

A detailed proposal will be included with the congregational meeting mailing which will include the proposed budget for the next fiscal year. Our elevator is very much used on Sunday mornings and at other times throughout the week. As we continue to pray for increased ministry in the building, good and reliable access to all areas is critical. Please hold this project and those involved in researching the work and financing in prayer.

### Recycling at Zion

Zion is participating in the City of Harrisburg's recycling program. Items that are to be recycled include: unwanted bulletins and other used office paper; cardboard and paperboard (e.g. cereal boxes); plastic soda and water bottles; aluminum and tin food and beverage cans. These items can be placed in the blue bin in Fellowship Hall. Items such as used paper or Styrofoam plates and cups, napkins, and plastic utensils should be discarded in the trash. A list of all recyclable items are posted at the blue bin, in the kitchen, and by the trash cans at the rear door of the church.

### **Outreach Organization of the Month**

#### May: Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, www.centralpafoodbank.org

The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank has been dedicated to ending hunger for more than 30 years. The Food Bank started as a one-day demonstration project on World Food Day in 1981. To address the needs of hungry families, the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank began permanent operation on October 16, 1982.

Originally, the Food Bank was located in a converted movie theater in Steelton. In 1991, the Food Bank initiated a capital campaign, raising \$1.5 million directed to the construction of a brand new warehouse. In 1994, the Food Bank relocated to its current facility in Harrisburg. In 2002, a second warehouse was added in Williamsport, to better serve the northern tier of our territory. In 2012, the Food Bank's Harrisburg warehouse underwent a second expansion, which added 28,000 square feet onto the existing warehouse.

<u>Opportunities</u> <u>to Donate</u>

Please continue to bring non-perishable food items for the Ecumenical Food Pantry and Clothing for the Clothing Bank. Serving 27 counties, the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank is the largest nonprofit food distribution organization in central PA. The Food Bank solicits, inventories and distributes food and other donated products to more than 800 partner agencies (food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, etc.) that directly serve people struggling with hunger. The Food Bank distributes more than 32 million pounds of food and grocery products per year.. That is the equivalent of 27 million meals!

The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank serves the following counties: Adams, Bedford, Blair, Bradford, Centre, Clearfield, Clinton, Columbia, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Juniata, Lancaster, Lebanon, Lycoming, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Perry, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, Union and York.

#### June: The Voice of the Martyrs, www.persecution.com

The Voice of the Martyrs is a non-profit, **inter-denominational Christian organization** dedicated to assisting our persecuted family worldwide. VOM was founded in 1967 by Pastor Richard Wurmbrand, who was imprisoned 14 years in Communist Romania for his faith in Christ. His wife, Sabina, was imprisoned for three years. In the 1960s, Richard, Sabina, and their son, Mihai, were ransomed out of Romania and came to the United States. Through their travels, the Wurmbrands spread the message of the atrocities that Christians face in restricted nations, while establishing a network of offices dedicated to assisting the persecuted church. The Voice of the Martyrs continues in this mission around the world today through the following main purposes:

#### VOM's Five Main Purposes

- 1. To encourage and empower Christians to fulfill the Great Commission in areas of the world where they are persecuted for sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ.
- 2. To provide practical relief and spiritual support to the families of Christian martyrs.
- 3. To equip persecuted Christians to love and win to Christ those who are opposed to the gospel in their part of the world.
- 4. To undertake projects of encouragement, helping believers rebuild their lives and Christian witness in countries where they have formerly suffered oppression.
- 5. To promote the fellowship of all believers by informing the world of the faith and courage of persecuted Christians, thereby inspiring believers to a deeper level of commitment to Christ and involvement in His Great Commission.

Our ministry is based on Hebrews 13:3:

Remember them that are in bonds, as bound with them; and them which suffer adversity, as being yourselves also in the body.

#### VOM's Mission Statement

Serving persecuted Christians through practical and spiritual assistance and leading other members of the Body of Christ into fellowship with them.


In our prayers, we pray for the persecuted church. This organization helps connect us to those suffering for the sake of Christ around the world.
